## 素 Year 5 Spanish



Hola niños

I hope you and your families are all well.
Last week we were learning about different times of the day and this week we are learning how to tell the time in Spanish. Your Spanish number knowledge is going to come in really handy for this! Look at the two clocks above. The first one shows it is 10 o'clock and the second one shows it is 4 o'clock. The Spanish 'a' stands for 'at' so 'a las cuatro' means 'at 4 o'clock.' Now we can use the words we learnt last week to say what time it is during the day.
¿Qué hora es? = What time is it?
Son las diez por la mañana $=I t$ is 10 o'clock in the morning.
Es la una por la tarde = It is 1 o'clock in the afternoon (this sentence uses 'es' because the number 1 is singular so different to all of the other numbers).

Son las cuatro por la tarde $=\mathrm{It}$ is 4 o'clock in the afternoon. $_{\text {in }}$
Son las seis por la tarde $=I \dagger$ is $60^{\prime}$ clock in the evening.
Son las once por la noche $=I \dagger$ is 11 o'clock in the night. $_{\text {t }}$
Mediodía $=$ Midday
Medionoche $=$ Midnigh $\dagger$

Remember in Spanish when a question is asked an upside down question mark is put at the beginning of the question.

What time is it on the clocks below? Write out the answers in Spanish and also add if it is in the morning/afternoon/evening/night.


As an optional extra you may find it useful to draw a clock face and put all the numbers on in Spanish like the one below:
