English: Plants of the World report.

Today, lease begin the task of writing up you 'plants of the _____' report. You will need to fill in the biome you have been researching for the title.

You will need to use your research and planning turning this into a longer piece of writing, using full sentences and paragraphs. Remember to start a new paragraph for each new topic.

Try to include the following:

- Use paragraphs •
- Use headings and subheadings
- Write in the present tense
- Use technical vocabulary (words for the topic e.g. scientific words about plants)
- Begin your sentences in different ways
- Make sure you use facts



Maths: Doubling and halving numbers.

Please write today's date and title in your homework book.

We use the same method to find half of a number as we did to double. Begin by partitioning the number so 30 and 6. Find half of 30 and then half of 6. Put the 2 answers back together. For example:

36

15

 \checkmark

This is the same as: $36 \div 2 = 18$

Use the place value cards (or the ones you made) from Tuesday. Get the ones cards and take out all of the odd numbers so you are left with only the even numbers (02468). Keep all of the tens numbers. Shuffle both piles separately and lay face down in two piles. As you did on Tuesday, take a card from each pile and halve this using the above method. Remember you will need to think carefully when you halve 30, 50, 70 and 90...we did this together before Easter, so today's lesson is revision. If you find it tricky to do the higher numbers, just begin with using a 10 and only picking up a ones card to make numbers under 20. When you feel happy with this, move on to 40 (missing out 30), and then going back to 30 when you get the hang of it. If you want a challenge - you can try making some hundreds place value cards and adding those in too.

Please show your working out in your book and also write the division sum next to this.

Remember - halving is the same as dividing by 2.
