



End of a Vacation

A well-known Christian writer once said, "We're all going on a summer holiday / no more working for a week or two / fun and laughter on a summer holiday / no more worries for me or you / for a week or two."

Having recently returned from my own summer holiday – or, to give it its posh name, 'annual leave' – I particularly

enjoyed the "no more worries": no sudden onset of fear during breakfast that I should actually be taking a school assembly at that very minute.

But now back to work / school / etc! And even if one is retired (which I can only imagine must feel like a perpetual holiday) this time of year might still be marked by a particular sentiment:

the end of a vacation, now back to work.

Back to work, yes – but perhaps in an (ever-so-slightly) different way. Hopefully feeling refreshed, yes; but maybe something more than that. Back at the desk with a new wisdom won from spending two weeks off. The wisdom that, at the very least, it feels rather healthy and beneficial to take a break.

Rest is important in Christianity – so important it's even in the Ten Commandments: "Six days shalt thou labour, and do all that thou hast to do; but the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord thy God..."

God took a day off after he made heaven and earth and all creation. God's people Israel, in ancient times, would have seemed quite unusual to their neighbours in taking a day off once a week: the Sabbath day.

> The importance of rest (or 'Sabbath') is one of those basic bits of Christianity that has become slightly trendy again to talk about. (I am assuming *The Church* Times book page counts as 'trendy' here.)

It needs talking about because it is easily forgotten. We might think, "because I'm a Christian, that means I am one of

those people that DON'T have a lie in and a rest on a Sunday morning". Our image of a Good Person is probably someone zipping about here and there doing all sorts of Good Things with unceasing zeal. (I once knew a somewhat workaholic clergyman whose favourite bible verse was 1 Cor. 15.58: "your labour in the Lord is not in vain", which he interpreted to mean: "make sure you're always doing SOMETHING!" He is now a very senior cleric.)

watching telly or playing computer games or (my favourite) sitting down with a hot drink and staring vacantly into the middle distance? Do these things have value?


They are worldly things... but doesn't God love the world? (John 3.16 – if you really needed the reference!) Doesn't God love who we really are – the you that likes cricket; the me that likes 1970s ambient electronica – not just the 'who' we pretend to be when we dress up nicely and put on our best behaviour Sunday mornings? Doesn't the experience of Martha and Mary tell us that God in Jesus just really wants to come and spend some time with us – not necessarily have us run round and do loads of stuff to try and show him we care?

"A Sabbath rest remains for the people of God," writes the author of the Letter to the Hebrews, implicitly linking the weekly Sabbath day off with the great Sabbath – "God's rest" – at the end of time. The writer exhorts his readers to "make every effort to enter that rest". And who will enter into that rest? "We who have believed enter that rest."

A time of rest, then, is not just a gift from God ("the Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath") but also a foretaste of the joys of the age to come – joys prepared by the God who appreciates a good rest.

MOSSAF



Since the last newsletter we have held two MOSSAF meetings. The first back in July (picture above) where we were treated to a guided tour of Plympton St Mary's by Rev'd Ian Provost. Some of us had attended services at the Church but had never noticed the splendour this historic Church held within. Many were intrigued by the font with its unusual rising lid and there was also a very detailed scaled model of St Mary's. The visit ended with Evening Prayer and Steve was invited to part lead with Father Ian. This concluded a fantastic visit which all the group enjoyed and we were very grateful to Ian for showing us around.



In August, MOSSAF were back at St Stephen's where our guest speaker was Bill Hill, who has been Chaplain to HM Prison Service for 42 years. Bill and his wife settled in Exeter where they ran a Fish 'n' Chip Shop together. One night when Bill came home his wife wasn't there but soon after came in to announce she had been to Church. The following week Bill went with her and he and his wife were soon baptised. Bill's interest in his faith grew and he started ministerial training. By now Bill had become a taxi driver and he took great delight in telling tales and listening and giving advice to others. Cab 15 became known as the 'vestry on wheels'. One day a letter was passed to Bill in his cab from a young man, stating he had

taken Bill's advice but was now in prison. A surprised Bill went to visit the prison to find out what had happened. The man had taken his advice to turn the other cheek and walk away instead of fighting, but had then written a letter to the other party saying, "If you don't leave me alone, I will kill you." This led to his arrest and a prison sentence. After a few visits Bill was asked if he would go into the prison and talk to the inmates. This led to him becoming Chaplain and so his new life begin in earnest. His duties at one point included serving as a chaplain in a reform school. Bill told us many tales and also read moving poems from inmates of both chaplaincies. The evening was a great success and Bill was given rapturous applause.

We have had some really great evenings this year. If you haven't been yet, why not join us? Recent Events continued

START - Visit to Buckland Abbey



A select few, led by Bob Cartwright, drove over to the Abbey to start our tour in the huge 15th century tithe barn. The Abbey was founded in 1278 by Amicia, Countess of Devon, and is one of the last Cistercian houses to be built in England. After the Dissolution of the Monasteries in 1539 the estate was sold to Sir Richard Grenville the Elder, a poet and a soldier. With his son, Sir Roger, they began the conversion of the abbey into a fine residence. Sir Roger was the captain of the Mary Rose and drowned when his ship floundered off Portsmouth in 1545 so it fell to Sir Richard's grandson to complete the work, which he did by 1576. Eventually in 1581 the family sold the estate to Sir Francis Drake who resided there for 15 years. The estate was sold to the National Trust in 1947 and they have carried out restoration work and together with Plymouth Museum and Art Gallery have furnished rooms to tell the story of the seafaring adventurers who helped to change the fate of England.

Nine years ago the self portrait of Rembrant displayed there was re-attributed and now is valued at £30m. My eye was taken by the painting of 'Peasants dancing outside a tavern with a village church in the distance'. We inspected the collection of horse-drawn implements and a cider press. Also a number of ship models were admired. Some items such as Drake's Drum have been taken to The Drum. Finally we stepped across to the Oxen Yard to view the independent craft workshops and eat lunch in the café.


Harvest Supper St Stephen's Church **Monday 3 October** 6.30pm
