# Handwriting

## **English and History**

Watch the video of the opening of the museum, then begin your work as a history detective! We would like you to look closely at the photographs of the museum artefacts, if possible with one of your parents. Talk about what you can see, use adjectives to describe the objects, ask questions and make ideas about what these artefacts could be, how they were used, who might have used them, and what they are made from. You do not need to write anything down today, as this is a speaking and listening activity, to gather ideas and bring out all those lovely questions and interesting words. This will help you with your writing task tomorrow. You may even be lucky enough to have some real Victorian artefacts in your own home. If you have, you could send us some pictures that we can share with the class.

### Maths - This week is all about Number bonds, addition and subtraction.

Today we are revisiting and practising our number bonds (pairs of numbers that add together) to make 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10

- Can you remember the number bonds to ten quickly? How fast can you say them? There is a powerpoint number bond challenge that you can try if you have a computer, or a robot worksheet that you can complete.
- 2) If you are ready to do some more, then it's time to do some investigating. Make a collection of 6 toys. How many different ways can you share them out into 2 groups? Write a number sentence for each different way eg. 3 + 3 = 6. These are all the number bonds that make 6. How many are there?
- 3) Do the same for 7, 8, and 9. You may be able to play a game with an adult where they hide some of the toys, and you have to work out how many they have hidden, by counting the toys left on the floor. How quickly can you remember these number bonds?

**This afternoon...** If you are able to, have a go at creating some old looking paper that we can use in our English lesson tomorrow, to make labels for our museum. All you need is some white paper, some coffee granules, water, and a brush. Put some instant coffee in a mug, mix with a little cold water so that it makes a sort of watery brown paint, and paint it all over your sheet of paper. It is quite good to let the mixture pool up a little bit in some areas, as this makes the paper look even older. Let it dry, then cut into pieces ready to write on tomorrow (an A4 piece of paper divided into either 2 or 3 pieces should be about the right size). If you don't have coffee you could rub a wet tea bag over the paper instead. Have fun! Parents: Just have a coffee... or a tea. You deserve it!!
